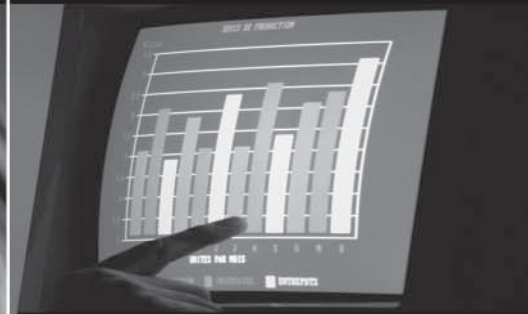

# STUDENTS *Teaching* STUDENTS

2006-2007 YEAR IN REVIEW



**W**HO IS CONSIDERED A LEADER? How do you become a leader? What are the styles of leadership? What skills do you need to become a leader? With these questions in mind, students were given the task of creating projects to develop leadership skills and make a difference within their schools. Students began by meeting with their school administration and then went to work. Students submitted a written project plan detailing their project idea, responsibilities assigned to each team member, a timeline for completion and expected outcomes. The projects are to be completed by November 2007. The goal is to not only have an impact within each school but to air a student-produced video highlighting the projects to middle and high school students on Channel 1 throughout the 11 school districts represented by students involved in the 20/20 Leadership program.

## BENEFITS OF “STUDENTS TEACHING STUDENTS”

- Students have the opportunity to make a major impact within their schools.
- Students learn how to work together as a team and deal with a number of issues, such as: What do you do if a team member isn't doing what he or she is supposed to do?
- Students listen to students. Planning, implementing and completing projects brings about a sense of accomplishment and allows students to recognize their own strengths and weaknesses.

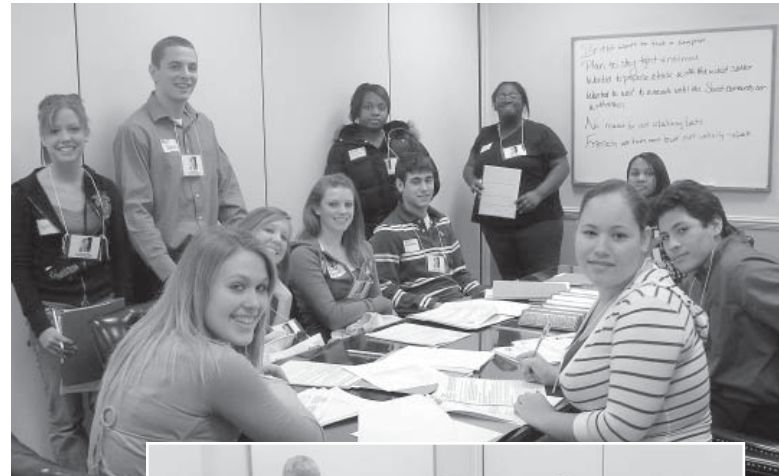

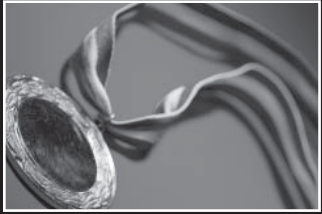

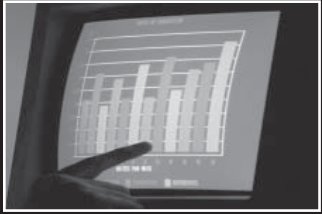
